Total Solar Eclipse is Totally Awesome


ILR members were well prepared for the April 8 total solar eclipse in Northeast Ohio, thanks in large part to Ann Cleary.

Ann, an ILR instructor and retired high school earth and space science teacher, led more than a half-dozen virtual and in-person eclipse presentations in early 2024. Her one-hour programs explained the how and why of solar eclipses, what totality means, plus how and where to safely observe the eclipse.

But Ann was careful not to share everything with program attendees.

"I didn't want to tell people precisely what to expect," she says, referring to the dramatic change as the eclipse transitions from 99 to 100 percent totality. "Watching a total solar eclipse should be each person's own unique experience." Ann, who traveled to St. Louis to witness totality during the 2017 eclipse, enjoyed this year's event on her own backyard deck in the company of her family, including grandsons aged 10 and 14.

"This one far exceeded my expectations because I got to share that special moment at home," Ann says. "Everyone cheered and I could see the big smiles on their faces."

Her key takeaways from the big event? "It's universal – we all now get it," she explains. "I think of the eclipse as an analogy for life: You hope for the best and you must be truly present."

The next total solar eclipse in Ohio will occur in 2099, and Ann hopes her 80s-something grandsons will get to see it again. "It's really cool to think **they'll be talking about it with their families**," she says, "and remembering when we all watched it together in 2024."

"It was awesome. I don't think I knew what to expect, but it was beyond anything I could imagine. And I wish I could see it again, but I'll have to travel to do that."

"I felt very, very enlightened. I like the night skies and the stars and everything. This was a once-in-a-lifetime experience for me and I really, truly enjoyed it."

"Just amazing! They told you the time it was coming and what was going to happen and it was like: 'Wow! How could they know all of this?' But it happened at the time they said. Really cool!"



Bernard "Bernie" L. Sater passed away Jan. 26 at the age of 93. Bernie's friend and ILR Curriculum Committee Co-Chair Don Auble expressed his condolences to Bernie's family:

I will miss Bernie. Because our curiosity and interests were similar, we often signed up for the same ILR classes. He always had a good question or two; "fully engaged," as they say.

While he was at North American Aviation he worked on the electrical systems of the Navy's big reconnaissance aircraft, the RA-5C, the "Vigilante." He delighted in telling the story of how the Navy wanted to reduce the electrically-controlled flight control system to one system (to save cost) instead of a double-redundancy system which NAA had designed. "On one of the first

flight tests, the aircraft lost the first system and everyone was glad that there was the backup system!"

A life well lived.

Joyce S. Dobson, age 83, passed away on April 17. ILR President Doug Imhoff shared his memory of Joyce:

Joy lived eight houses from me in our over-55 community development. I heard the news [of her passing] from one of our neighbors today. I had actually talked to her a month ago at an event during St Patrick's Day.

Joy was a great lady and will be missed! She did significant work for ILR, especially during our transition period during COVID in the year 2020. She was also in charge of our class coordinators for several years.
